# Senior Project Helps Students In El Salvador

Mineola High School senior Miguel Velásquez spent time in El Salvador recently to visit with and share more than four suitcases full of donated art supplies to students at the Centro Escolar Caserio Upire.

Miguel had previously visited the school in El Salvador because it is the one his own father had attended.

Driven by the school's lack of supplies to engage students creatively, Miguel decided to host a drive for supplies and to personally visit the school, shadowing the teachers there, as part of his senior project.

"It was an eye-opening experience when I first visited the school. It was a wake-up call to really appreciate what we have here," Miguel said. "I'm so thankful for the sacrifices my parents made for me to have an education in America and I felt I needed to support these students in any way I could. I'm grateful to the entire Mineola commu-



nity for their support in donating for these students."

During his time shadowing first through third grade teachers at Cen-

tro Escolar Caserio Upire, Miguel has confirmed his desire to pursue a teaching degree with the intent of working with dual language learners. He will be attending Adelphi University in the fall, majoring in adolescent education.





# **Rotary News**

#### **POP Officers Give Safety Tips**

On June 5th, two POP Officers from the Third Precinct made an informative presentation to the members of the Williston Park Rotary Club.

Officers Michael Costanzo and Jessie Copper from the Precinct's Problem Oriented Policing unit, discussed concerns about burglaries in East Williston and Williston Park, as well as other scams that tend to victimize older residents. In addition to the Rotarians, Mayor Parente from East Williston, and Mayor Ehrbar from Williston Park were in attendance, to raise issues important to their residents.

The Officers suggested several easy and commonsense ways that residents can limit their exposure to burglary. An obvious one is to make sure that your house looks occupied. If you are going to be away, make sure to stop your mail and newspapers, and to keep your lawn tended. Burglars look for tall grass, indicating that a family may be away. Keeping shrubs trimmed around the perimeter of the house is another easy way to deny a burglar a place to hide, as is the use of motion sensor lights.

If you are away, don't publicize your vacation on Facebook, or in other so-



cial media. A photo of you and your family in a foreign location suggests that your house may be an easy target for burglars, and your postings aren't always limited to "friends."

Another criminal scheme involves "mailbox fishing," where a thief will put a sticky substance on the end of a stick or pole and use it to pull up envelopes from mailboxes. The criminals are looking for checks, which they then convert by washing the ink off and putting their own names on the face. They then cash the check. The officers suggested that if you are mailing a check don't put it in the corner mailbox, drop it off at the post office instead. They also suggested using a "pigmented pen" to endorse checks. The ink from these pens can't be



washed off and provides another means of frustrating a mailbox fisherman.

The officers emphasized that residents should call 911 when they see something that concerns them. The call will be sent out to a patrol officer

who will respond. The officers pointed out that, on occasion, a serious incident will coincide with a quality of life issue and in that case the serious incident will be given priority. However they made it clear that a resident's concerns will be taken seriously and will be responded to.

It was a pleasure to hear from these two officers, and to know that the POP program is once again in operation in our Precinct.

#### A Little Free Library Comes to the Pool

The members of the Rotary Club voted to provide a Little Free Library Stand for the Roger Fay Pool.

The Little Free Library is the world's largest book sharing movement, enabling people to take a book and share a book from a weatherproof stand.

Rotarian Ken Marissael did a fantastic job building the stand for the pool, and Zolezzi Auto Body provided a waterproof paint job so that it will withstand many years of rain, and provide many years of book access to Pool visitors

# Fill Your House With the Scent of Spring **Plant Dwarf Lilacs by a Window**



Lilacs are wonderful garden shrubs. They are quite beautiful, and very winter hardy. The fragrance of lilacs is synonymous with Spring. They remind many of us of cool mornings on the porch, warm afternoons, and the promise of summer. The scent of lilacs coming through an open screened window is a thing to be treasured.

Traditional lilacs, however, can pose problems for those of us who garden on smaller plots, as they are very vigorous, and can grow to be quite large, blocking out windows and requiring aggressive pruning.

A solution can be found, however, by planting dwarf lilacs, particularly the dwarf Korean varieties.

A favorite on Long Island is one known as Miss Kim. It can be trained to grow no higher than 4 feet, so it can be planted by a window, and it flowers quite vigorously. If you plant in an area where it can catch the breeze, an open window will allow your entire house to be filled with the essence of springtime. The flowers don't last all that long, and a hot spell will quickly cause the blooms to turn brown, but while they are in bloom there is nothing quite like them.

Once the flowers fade a quick pruning will encourage growth and blooms for next year. That is the only way that they are finicky—if you wait until late summer to prune away the spent flowers you will prune next year's buds.

Aside from that, however, with relatively little work, once planted, you will have a beautiful and rewarding flowering shrub for many years to come.

# Some Thoughts On Memorial Day

I would like to introduce you to a very special organization whose mission is to transport America's Veterans to Washington, DC to visit those memorials dedicated to honor the service and sacrifices of themselves and their friends.

Honor Flight Network (HFN) is a non-profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their sacrifices. It transports our heroes to Washington, DC to visit and reflect at their Memorials. Top priority is given to the senior veterans – World War II survivors, along with those other veterans who may be terminally ill. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, an estimated 640 WWII veterans die each day. Obviously, time to express thanks to these brave men and women is running out.

I have a first cousin (by marriage) who was one of the few remaining veterans of World War II. His name is Ted Lekas. He served as a Seabee in the Pacific during the war. I would visit Ted and my cousin Nora every time I was on the east coast of Florida, but unfortunately, Ted passed away last year at the age of 93. Lo and behold, I found out that Ted had been earlier honored by the aforementioned HFN. Here is an edited version of Ted's description of that truly exciting

"My longtime friend and Westinghouse associate, Roger Ray, asked me if I would like to go on the Honor Flight to visit the World War II Monument. He would be my Guardian and put up the required funds. He would be with me for the entire trip, overseeing my needs and comfort. It was a dream that I thought would never come true and there it was. So after checking with my doctor, I was told to go ahead and enjoy the trip. Roger and I were both excited in anticipation of the trip.

At the Miami International Airport, the general public was thanking me for my service along the

passage way to the plane. We were given breakfast and prepared to board the plane. I would guess about 50% or more of the Veterans (including me) were in Honor chairs (wheel chairs). We were wheeled through the plane ramp to the door of the plane by our Guardians. On the plane the Guardian sat next to the assigned Veteran – in my case, Roger. In my row on the plane was the oldest Veteran on the tour, 100 years old and in perfect health. On takeoff, firetrucks on either side of the lane, with flashing lights and water

The bronze portrayals along the walls of the walkways of the Memorial of everyday life in America was depicted as well as some historical events.

Then we chose to see the Korean War memorial. All this time Roger was doing all the navigating of my Honor chair. It was a long walk from the WWII memorial to the steps of the Lincoln Memorial and then about 100 yards to the Korean Memorial. There were (19) life sized stainless steel figures (each covered with a tan substance) that appear to be on patrol in Korea in what could be

cannons, fired an arc of water over the airplane as a salute to the veterans.

The time passed quickly and we reached Ronald Reagan National Airport (DCA) Washington, DC in two and a half hours. We boarded deluxe tour buses and headed for the World War II Memorial. Our four bus convoy had police car escorts front and rear with sirens and flashing red

The WWII Memorial was a wonderful sight. At one end, off in the distance, stood the Lincoln Memorial and at the other end stood the Washington Monument. It was explained that the WWII Memorial is not only dedicated to the veterans but to the entire population of the United States of America for their contribution of tireless labor to produce the arms and equipment to support our fighting men. There was so much to see as we toured.

enemy territory. You could read their facial expression of alertness, fear, and readiness in a hostile climate. There is great detail in every item down to the weapons they carried. There is a black polished granite wall along one side of the soldiers displayed that had etched faces and scenes into the surface. These were copied from actual unidentified photos of soldiers, marines, sailors and airmen.

Next we boarded our buses and headed for the Women's Memorial. It was explained to us that if we wanted to witness the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown we must make the stop at the Woman's Memorial a brief rest stop. All agreed. In the building there were a number of displays depicting all the services women performed during the U.S. military experiences. Overall, the Women's Memorial seemed to occupy a large area, and deservedly so.

I'm sure we all had the remembrances of the men we left behind and how proud they

This Memorial Day American Legion Williston Post 144 held their 63rd Annual Post Everlasting Services and Parade.


This year the key note speaker at the Everlasting Service was our own Nassau County Clerk Ms. Maureen O' Connell.

The National Circus Project provided a noontime program of juggling, plate spinning, balancing (tables on the chin, for example), comedy, and clowning.


The Remarkable Renaldo, and Little Lou, had the audience of children, parents and grandparents laughing, clapping and occasionally gasping with amazement at their talent.








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# **Fordham Street May Crowning**








vou card which was sent back to the East Williston Scouts.

Over the summer, we will be working on bears for the October "Special


Friends" dance hosted by the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary. We plan on dressing all the bears in Halloween costumes which should be fun!


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
