

A Thanksgiving Tradition and a Labor of Love

If you want to be a part of something truly amazing please read this.

This is the story of Melinda and John Alford, their 5 children, and the power of community generosity and compassion.

We started our Thanksgiving program in 1996 after the birth of our fifth child.

We decided to shut down JB's Pub in Mineola (which John owned at the time) on Thanksgiving Day and serve Thanksgiving dinners to 50 people recommended by local churches, free of charge,

Over the next couple of years, we started to include delivering full dinners to homebound senior citizens living throughout Nassau County. That part of

the day became so large that we decided to focus on the delivery portion of the holiday.

In 2001, John closed the restaurant, but we continued to do the deliveries from our home. Many people help with the cooking of the turkeys and making desserts. About 40 cars show up at our home on Thanksgiving afternoon to help us deliver the food!

Last year, food was provided for over 400 people on Thanksgiving Day. 25 families received the fixings to make their own holiday meal, 50 people had a sit-down "catered" dinner at Mary's Manor in Inwood on Thanksgiving afternoon, and over 250 homebound seniors received a full, traditional Thanksgiving meal delivered to them, along with a visit.

The only reason that this program continues to be such a success is that there are so many people who are willing to help our family through donations of food, time and money. We are incredibly grateful to all those who help us and have made this part of their tradition as well!

If you would like to help this year, here is more information;

On Thursday, November 27th, Thanksgiving Day, we will be preparing and delivering hot meals to homebound senior citizens, coordinating this program from our home. Last year we provided over 400 meals and we expect to be doing the same this year.

We are in need of donations of desserts, individual non-carbonated beverages, mini loaves of bread or dinner rolls, turkeys, and cash in order to complete the meals. These items can be dropped off at our home at 35 Maxwell Road, Garden City. Please call us as soon as possible to coordinate a convenient drop off time.

All deliveries will begin at 12 noon on Thanksgiving Day. Each delivery is accompanied by a visit, if so welcomed by the recipient. We deliver to between 35 and 40 different towns within Nassau County; please call us if you are able to help with the delivery of the meals.

This project has become a special part of our family tradition for the past nineteen years, and we invite you to make it part of yours, as well. Your generous donations of food, money, and time have made the deliveries a tremendous success each year. With your help, we can continue to bring a meal and a smile to those who are alone on the holiday.

What Happens when a person passes away out of state?

In today's mobile society and with many seniors spending the winter months in a warmer climate deaths, whether expected or not, sometimes take place out of New York State. Many families are placed under more stress than usual when they lose a loved one out of state and very often have feelings of confusion and helplessness. Listed below are a few simple guidelines to help bereaved families cope and understand the process involved when a death takes place out of state.

- If services and final disposition are all going to take place back in New York you need only to make one call to your New York funeral home.
- Your New York funeral home will contact thru their extensive network of funeral professionals a reputable out-of-state funeral professional to have your loved one brought back to New York.
- By calling a New York funeral home directly you will avoid unnecessary charges from an out of state funeral home. Instead, when your New York funeral home contacts the out-of-state funeral professional they will be extended "Professional Courtesy Charges" and in turn these charges will be passed along to you. Often these courtesy charges are less than if the family called the out of town funeral director directly thus saving the family a significant amount of money.
- The New York funeral home will coordinate with the out-of-state funeral professional the transfer from the place of death, preparation, filing of necessary permits and transportation of your loved one to the airport.
- The New York funeral home will be given the appropriate flight information in order to schedule services and final disposition in New York as well as meet your loved one at the New York airport and then be taken into the care of the New York funeral home

Wine & the Holidays

Each November, I find myself being asked one of two questions “what kind of wine do I bring to Thanksgiving?” and “what kind of wine do I serve at Thanksgiving?” While the holiday gatherings can be stressful for many reasons, let’s make sure wine isn’t one of them!

Q. “What kind of wine do I bring to Thanksgiving dinner?”

A. As a rule, never give a wine you haven’t tasted. I don’t care if it’s Thanksgiving, New Year’s, or a host gift – never blindly buy and give a bottle of wine. Make sure you’ve tasted and liked the wine you want to give someone.

As for what to give, I tend to like giving a bottle of champagne at Thanksgiving. If the host doesn’t open it, they have something to open for New Year’s Eve. If they do decide to open it, a brut champagne can stand up nicely to a main course.

Q. “What kind of wine do I serve at Thanksgiving dinner?”

A. Always have a bottle of red and a bottle of white on hand. I know some people who can’t stand the tannins in red wine, and others who can’t handle the sulfites in white wine. As a host you always want to have both on hand, just in case.

For a white wine, you definitely want a white that has the acidity to cut through fattier food. My go to for whites lately have either been Cloudy Bay Sauvignon Blanc. Barring that, ask your wine merchant for a solid New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc.

As for our red drinking friends, I am going to suggest going with either a Malbec or a Merlot. Malbec is robust enough to pair really well with most dishes and won’t detract from the turkey. Merlot isn’t as bold as a Cabernet, nor as mild as a Pinot Noir – just in case you have folks who are passionate about one or the other, they will likely respect your decision to compromise between the two strengths here.

Remember! Always taste wines you intend to give as gifts!



I Remember When

Based on *The Last Walk on Our Block*, a book about growing up in the Willistons in the 50's, 60's and 70's.

Being a participant at the recent Williston Park Street Fair at the Williston Post table, was indeed a true honor and pleasure. Meeting and greeting such an amazing number of most interesting and engaging people from the Williston's and Long Island placed my personal passage in true perspective. So many people came over to thank me for writing the book; however I am the one needing to extend the thanks. The *Last Walk on Our Block* has become a shared vision of a wonderful past that so many of us have had the distinct pleasure of taking. Thank you all for allowing me to join the ride! Our journey linking the past to the present and the future continues below:

It was October of 1961. We were a few weeks away from once again seeing the Yankees win the World Series (defeating the Cincinnati Reds in five games), which was a sort of anticlimax after having lived through the thrilling Mantle – Maris Home Run Chase throughout the season! While I liked Roger, I loved Mickey! But once that was over, it meant that Halloween would soon be upon us!

Halloween back in the day was truly a block affair. We thought about it all during school and couldn't wait to get home, get changed, gather together and start trick or treating. We had no school the next day, so for a youngster, it was a special day and night! We would trick or treat in packs, most of us in our homemade costumes, except for the rich kids, who got to go to Woolworths, Smiles or perhaps The Big D and buy that cardboard box, with the clear plastic cover that housed the latest Superman, Batman or Casper the Friendly Ghost Costume.

Somehow, somehow one year I was fortunate enough to either inherit or acquire a Mighty Mouse costume. I absolutely loved that cartoon show, watching Mighty Mouse forever come to 'Save the Day'. I once 'advised' my friend, cousin and next door neighbor that when I put the whole costume on I knew for sure that I could actually fly, but, as I would always tell him, 'I decided not to' for fear of getting into trouble with the 'higher authorities', meaning our parents.

But it was finally Halloween and we were thrilled! At times it was scary, especially if you were granted parental permission to trick or treat in the evening. One had to avoid getting pelted with eggs and sock sacks filled with flour from the bullies who lived on other streets. The kids on our block surely didn't do that stuff!

Our bags got lighter as we walked because we would be eating the treats as we tricked, and when we got home, for some reason, my loot was never as much as my older siblings. This always annoyed me! Why were they so much better at getting treats than me!

We also lived through the big scare of some sicko putting pins into kids' candy. This resulted in everyone having to undergo mandatory parental candy checks at home when we returned with our bags full of booty. Parents would carefully feel through the candy for the suspected pins. No one on our block ever found one, but it made us all very fearful of the bags that were homemade! We had to dispose of them for fear of tampering. I wonder if all of our parents ever knew these were the ones we ate while we trick or treated!

Halloween's passing always meant one thing, Thanksgiving was coming! It was special, very special! But then again every Sunday was special.

Sundays were somewhat different back in the day. You couldn't shop on Sundays because the stores were not open, in fact the only nights that stores stayed open were Thursday and Friday evenings. If you didn't get your shopping done during those nights, the normal workweek or on Saturdays, you simply had to wait for the next Monday. Malls such as Roosevelt Field and Mid Island Plaza (Broadway Mall) in Hicksville were just being born and they too had limited hours.

Sunday dinner was always, always, always in the dining room. Mom kept her Corelle dishes in the cupboard and used our family china, not Grandma's china mind you because Grandma's was only to be used on Thanksgiving and Christmas. As our dear Aunt Estelle methodically set the dining room table she would be heard to say: "knife on the right, fork on the left" or maybe it was the other way around.

Thanksgiving obviously was turkey with all the delectable trimmings; my favorite has always been stuffing with gravy. In addition, Mom always made room for her little pickled onions. For some reason, we only ate them on Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving dessert had to include Dad's personally made Plum Pudding with some special brandy sauce that we were not allowed to have too much of. Oddly I never saw a plum. And then there were the cakes and pies such as apple, Dutch apple, pecan, custard, pumpkin, chocolate cream and occasionally something called rhubarb, which I think only Dad and my brother Jerry ate. I was still eating the stuffing!

From my family to yours: Happy Thanksgiving!

Every season has its beauty, but as I have grown older my favorite season happens to be the fall. When the fall comes, you know the summer is over and you know shortly thereafter the cold weather will be upon us. The fall season is unique and it's almost as if God paints a picture using all the colors on his palette as the leaves turn color right before your eyes.

This is why fall brings me upstate, especially to Connecticut where I know that from mid July to mid September it's time to go peach picking. My favorite place to go is a peach farm in Washington Depot, Connecticut, called Starberry Farms, located on Kielwasser Road off Route 202. I have been going there for years, both with my parents and then with my wife and children. Now that my children are older, my wife and I still enjoy going to the peach orchard to pick peaches. We pick small ones and big ones, some the size of softballs, the kind you bite into and peach juice rolls down your arm.

This year, we went back again as usual to fill up the car with peaches. My wife and I picked a few boxes of peaches, and headed back to the barn to pay for our pickings. It would have been easier to weigh me before I went into the field and then weigh me on the way out and just subtract the difference, because that's what I ate.

While my wife and I were waiting to pay for peaches, I started a conversation with the owners, Bob and Sally Futh. During some interesting conversation, I found out that they were from Williston Park. Once Bob mentioned Hildebrandt's in Williston Park the conversation grew in depth and we must have talked for an hour. Bob told me he moved to Williston Park in 1944. He believes the house he lived in was 91 Cornell Street. He even remarked about the pond at the end of Cornell and Willis and wanted to know if it was still there. I told him it is, but it is a drainage sump.

Bob was around five years old when he lived in Williston Park. He was born in Brooklyn right after the Second World War. He told me that times were good back then because of the multi-generation families that lived together.

Bob was telling me about the Rushmore farm stand in East Williston. Quite honestly, I listened attentively because I remember seeing pictures of this in the proximity of what now was the East Williston Village Green. Bob and his family lived in Williston Park until 1948.

Bob and Sally have 15 acres of land and planted approximately 1200 peach trees. He has approximately with varieties of yellow peaches and white peaches. A favored variety is Red Haven peaches which are sweet and delicious.



Bob and Sally have been in business since 1978 cultivating their orchard for the sale of the most delicious peaches in Connecticut. They are open to the public in mid-July until the second week of September. People come from all over to pick their peaches and many restaurants in the area feature their peaches on their menu.

Bob and Sally are truly the nicest people I have ever met, and why not, he's from Williston Park. He remembers all the details of his boyhood life in Williston Park. They truly have a passion for their peaches, and all the locals love to come and visit with them and meander in their orchard and pick peaches.

So you never know where you will be when you run into a former Willistonite. I will continue to visit Starberry Farm in the future, and I can't wait until the end of July because now I know I have dear friends from Williston Park which will make the adventure that much more enjoyable.

WILLISTON PARK HISTORY

We are fortunate to have received a submission from former Mayor and Williston Park Historian, the Honorable Roger Fay, concerning what is now the drainage sump along Willis Avenue. There was a time when it was much larger, and the centerpiece for what was known as the Willis Lake Stock Farm, a nationally recognized facility for boarding, pasturing and training horses "for road or track." Here is Mayor Fay's article.

It Has a History

A small body of water, probably two to three acres in size, during the 1800's it was called the Willis Stock Farm Lake and was often the subject of postcards, which showed its use as a recreational area, as well as a watering facility for the local farmers' cattle and stock. It was along the road between Hempstead and Cow Neck (now Willis Avenue) and a quarter of a mile north of the road from Herricks to Westbury (now known as Hillside Avenue) and was just southwest of Samuel Willis's stock farm.

When Samuel Willis died, his estate was well over five hundred acres, and one of his sons farmed the land which included the pond until 1900. The pond was the main water supply for many of the surrounding farms and their livestock, and many of the deeds at the time required the property owners to provide access to the pond.

While the water was essential to the local farms, too much could pose a problem. In December of 1917 heavy rains caused the pond to overflow, and it covered Willis Avenue to a depth of several feet. The rain was followed by a deep freeze, and Willis Avenue was covered by two feet of ice, which disrupted the trolley line which then ran along the Avenue.


The Willis family sold the property to the Cushings (who renamed the pond after themselves) who in turn sold all of the property except the pond to a Mr. Young, who ultimately sold it to William Chatlos, the developer of the Happiness Homes. As development continued, and what had once been farmers' fields were paved and built over, the need for drainage arose, and Mr. Chatlos acquired the pond. The youth of what became the new Village of Williston Park found the pond as a recreational area. In the summer the boys and girls could be seen fishing in the pond. In the winter it became an ice skating rink.

When Nassau County realigned and improved Willis Avenue, it also acquired easement rights to the pond from Mr. Chatlos and what was once known as Willis Lake became the storm water drainage facility that is there now. The County does not own the pond but merely has an easement for drainage purposes.

Mayor Fay closed his article with a suggestion:

"Geographically the property is close to the center of the Village and should be improved to be an asset rather than a depressant to the value of surrounding homes. Either improve it as a small pond with a fountain, spotlights and surround landscape, or put all the necessary drainage equipment underground and develop the area as a small park. Due to its history a combination of both would be appropriate."

We look forward to being able to share additional historical notes from Mayor Fay with our readers, and thank him for this very useful insight into the geography and history of Williston Park.




