Principal Dr. James Ruck and Superintendent of Schools Dr. Fino Celano, along with other administrators and members of the board of education, extended their congratulations




and praise to these highly-regarded seniors.

The Tzu Chi Foundation Brings Flood Relief to Louisiana

On Wednesday September 21st Ms. Lillian Kuo and Mr. Freeman Su of the Tzu Chi Foundation were the guest speakers a meeting of the Williston Park Rotary Club.

They gave a wonderful and informative presentation about the charitable activities of the Tzu Chi Foundation, and in particular the Foundation's disaster relief efforts in Louisiana.

Tzu Chi volunteers arrived in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on August 23, 2016, and promptly began their disaster relief assessment of the flood.

Ms. Kuo explained that the volunteers work with the civilian authorities to identify and quickly assist the neediest victims of the disaster.

They provide money, food and blankets, among other things, to all who are in need of them. (The blankets are manufactured from recycled water bottles. Ms. Kuo passed one around to the Rotarians, and they are astonishingly light, soft and warm.)

The mission of the Tzu Chi volunteers is to get the flood victims on their feet as soon as possible and back to some level of family living.

The Tzu Chi Foundation distributed over \$500,000 in aid to over 1,000 families. Over 100 volunteers were involved in the effort, and they will continue to provide relief to the tremendous numbers of flood survivors who still require it.

Tzu Chi is an international humanitarian organization whose mission is to relieve the suffering of those in need, and create a better world for all.

In Chinese, "tzu" means compassion, and "chi" relief. The Tzu Chi Foundation is an international humanitarian non-government organization that dedicated itself to the fields of medicine, education, environmental improvement and international relief. Among other things, the Tzu Chi Foundation is the largest bone marrow donor in the world.







The Foundation was established in Taiwan in May of 1966. Its members began raising money for charitable purposes by depositing the equivalent of 2 cents, daily, in small bamboo banks. The bamboo banks are still used by the Tzu Chi, to this day, to collect charitable donations on behalf of those in need and to awaken love and care

for others in the giver as well.

The Tzu Chi Foundation has a branch office at 60 East Williston Avenue in East Williston.



I would like to use this month's article to let hearing impaired readers know that they are eligible to receive a FREE CapTel 2400i captioned telephone.

Funding for this program is provided through the federal government under the Americans With Disabilities Act.

The only requirements are that recipients be certified as hearing impaired by an audiologist, and have

both a land line telephone and an internet connection in their home.

A representative from CapTel will even come to the home free of charge to install the telephone and provide instruction on how to operate it.

The CapTel 2400i makes it easy to en-


joy phone conversations again! It shows word for word captions during calls, has a large easy touch screen display, and a built in answering machine that captions messages.

Anyone interested in receiving this free phone should contact my office (516-873-9742) for an appointment.

In order to be certified as hearing impaired a recent audiogram performed within the last six months is required. Please bring a copy with you to your appointment. If you have not had a hearing evaluation recently I will be happy to perform one at your visit.

Most insurances cover the cost of the exam and there are no other obligations associated with your visit.



There were several contests on the course, which created a fun atmosphere for all the participants as well.



Caring for Our Pets

Canine Influenza (Dog Flu)

Canine Influenza is a relatively new disease caused by two viruses, H3N8 and H3N2.

The latter is an Asian strain and is brand new in the United States. Both cause respiratory disease.

This is a highly contagious disease that can spread quickly in situations where dogs are in close contact, such as boarding facilities, grooming parlors, doggie day care, dog shows, sporting events and training classes.

It is very important to avoid areas where dogs are in close contact and especially avoid to dogs who are showing signs of respiratory disease.

Canine influenza is spread easily in three ways:

- Direct contact (sniffing another dog)
- Airborne (inhaling the secretions from coughing or sneezing)
- Contaminated objects (eating or drinking out of a contaminated dog bowl)

Dogs can also spread the virus even before their clinical signs appear. The clinical signs are:

- Coughing
- Nasal or occular discharge
- Loss of appetite
- Lethargy
- Fever

These signs are similar to other respiratory diseases such as kennel cough, which is mostly bacterial.


Most cases will recover with appropriate medical attention, but some animals will develop pneumonia, which can be life threatening. The best way to prevent infection is through vaccination. There

is a vaccine for both strains. Two doses of each vaccine are given two weeks apart, then annually.

In our hospital, this is not a core vaccine (a vaccine every dog will receive, such as rabies) but is an elective vaccine if we consider the dog to be at high risk.



The trained counselors who worked with these boys were Jennifer Morissey and Bonnie Parente from Troop 200 and William Kempner from Troop 45.



BCCS who are dedicated to helping our children through special education and therapeutic services such as music, art, speech, occupational and physical therapies."


